Supported by professionals, 13 young people are designing how the Champions Board operates so its aim of being the key platform for looked after and care experienced children and young people to influence policy and practice is realised.  Better Meetings project – The young people who have been involved in this project presented the 3 videos they have produced to Sherriff Mackie from the Scottish Hearing Scotland Project. Their views and recommendations are now feeding into the redesign of the Children's Hearing system in Scotland. The videos are also being used for broader staff awareness raising and development purposes. Teachers stated they have an increased awareness of the impact of poverty and money worries on children and families. They report being more mindful ensuring that children have the resources at home when planning and assigning home learning / homework tasks. To celebrate the completion of this project, two events have been held, a local one in September and a national one in October where schools presented their good practice. From this, there will be a Moray guidance for schools along with an accessible toolkit which can be used and adapted. One of the best examples is the East End Primary website – they have created a page on Cost of the School Day, and ways in which parents can access support.

#### **Risks and Issues**

The pace of progress continues to be hindered by the lack of a Lead Officer for child poverty. As the cost of living crisis escalates, there is an urgent need to co-ordinate activity and pool resources across the	
partnership to mitigate the impact of poverty on children and families.	

#### **General Progress Commentary**

Progress continues to be made albeit at a slower pace than anticipated due to the challenges faced by all partner agencies.

A full review of the Children's Services Plan was undertaken in April 2022. A SMART action plan covering April 2022-March 2023 has been approved by GLG and is currently being implemented. A reporting cycle from the partnership groups responsible for overseeing the implementation of each of these priorities is operational. Work is now required to align this action plan with the LOIP, areas above where this has been attempted are noted in italics.

Priority over the past 6 months has been on the development of the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment, which will inform the priorities and associated actions within the Children's Services Plan 2023-26.

### Covid-19 Recovery impact on delivery

Capacity of partners to drive forward these priorities whilst also maintaining critical single agency service provision continues to limit pace of progress.

Staff fatigue is significant and an increase in need of families due to the impact of COVID19 is evident. This impacts on ability to move forward on partnership priorities.

Recruitment has been a challenge for some roles across the partnership with no/low number of applications for a number of vacancies. This creates time pressures for those administering these vacancies and then having to re-advertise posts. It also creates deficits within teams and a lesser ability to progress priorities.

Agreement needs to be reached on whether this plan will act as the children and families element of the LOIP.
