### 7 BUCKIE WEST: ASSESSING THE DEVELOPMENT BIDS

# 7.1 Buckie West: Landscape Survey and Site Observations

This study area has been further subdivided into two landscape character units. The level fields either side of the A942 are separated from the more undulating landform further west by a tributary of the Burn of Buckie. Key characteristics which influence settlement expansion include:


#### Level Fields

- this relatively level land extends between the Burn of Freuchny and the westerly tributary of the Burn of Buckie
- possibly due to its level character, the A942 bisects this area, and it is also the focus of the most extensive inland development of the settlement
- the landscape is relatively open, with arable and improved grassland fields divided by post and wire fencing
- the Burn of Buckie is a key natural feature, a deep den with steep, wooded slopes
- other trees are limited to features associated with buildings and the settlement, including lines of trees surrounding the Linzee Gordon Park
- this area is well related to the exiting settlement and its layout, as the A942 links directly into the centre of town
- the settlement edge along the A942 is fragmented, with outlying buildings creating some ambiguity about the sense of arrival
- most recent development has used features which are not particularly robust, such as field boundaries or tracks as a settlement edge

### Gentle Undulations

- These long, gentle north facing slopes rise up from the settlement to a series of subtle, rounded ridges between the settlement and the A98
- The slopes and ridges, although gentle in gradient and subtle in form, offer visual and physical containment for the settlement, most notably providing a visual screen from the A98 and allowing views over the ridge to the sea
- open, relatively featureless landscape of arable farm land and improved grassland, subdivided by post and wire fences
- · immediately west of the settlement is the Buckpool Golf course
- the civic amenity site and the new cemetery are well contained, if rather isolated, by a more enclosed area of landform associated with the Burn of Gollachy

- there are extensive views to the sea from within the settlement, and from the approach roads, which are elevated, allowing views across the settlement
- the settlement edges are emphasised by relatively minor features, such as a track, or a field boundary
- sense of arrival from the south is characterised by a pronounced descent into the settlement, with the hospital a feature building
